Funds Sought for Negroes Purged Off Welfare Rolls

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — A social worker placed a desperate plea for help to Washington Sunday, saying that 5,000 Negroes have been purged from state welfare rolls by new laws against "incompetence."

J. Harvey Kerner was prepared to take the plea for aid to the United Nations if his conference call with U. S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Arthur S. Flemming doesn't pay off.

Kerner, director of the Greater New Orleans Urban League, said hundreds of Negro women and children have been purged from the welfare rolls for food and rent, the most serious threat of hunger in his office.

Kerner said in the 1960 state Legislature under the new "segregation" laws, 5,000 Negroes were purged from the welfare rolls. He said the new laws are "designed to take care of children whose mothers have had illegitimate children or have lived in common-law marriages after going on welfare rolls."

Kerner said 50 per cent of the 5,000 new children in the welfare rolls are Negroes. "These children should not suffer for the sins of their parents," he said.

"In my 25 years as a social worker, I have never seen such suffering from hunger, ill health, and cold children crying out for help," said Kerner, whose letter to Gov. J. B. White asking for provision of the new laws has gone unanswered.

Air Force 1st Lt. Tommy K. Crowe of Superior, Arizona, has been participating in the "Conco Airlift" with the Military Air Transport Service Provisional Wing at Champaign Air Station in central France.

The MATS Provisional Wing came into being on July 16, when the United States responded to a United Nations request for strategic airlift support of its action in the Republic of the Congo. It has been operating successfully ever since then, airlifting US troops to the troubled central African area. In support of the troops, plant MATS C-124 "Globemasters" have flown in thousands of tons of equipment, supplies and food. The airlift, following closely MATS "C-124 Globemasters" in carrying out the airlift, will continue until the United Nations terminate its request.
