Now that it's all over, what did it cost?

The political campaigns, we mean.

No one will ever know for sure.

Too many loopholes in the law. The Corrupt Practices Act (of 1925) requires some reports on spending. But the only committees which have to report are those which operate in more than one state.

Hence, individual state committees can spend as much as they please without reporting to federal government.

Also, spending on primary campaigns does not have to be reported.

The law is also unclear on whether labor unions and business corporations can contribute to political campaigns. The law forbids direct contributions. But labor unions get around this. They give candidates money collected from union members as "voluntary" contributions.

Corporations get around it, too. They frequently put informal pressure on top executives to make personal contributions.

So what can be said about the cost of the election?

In the first eight months of 1960, these amounts were collected:

Keeping in mind the loopholes in the law, and the fact that the "hot" political months of September and October were not included, I doubt if that total represents much more than one-tenth the actual figure.

Yumans Hit Record Vote In General

More Yuma County voters went to the polls Tuesday than any other election in history.

Total vote cast was 12,910, according to R. L. Odom, clerk of the Board of Supervisors. This was 81.25 per cent of the 15,889 registered voters in the county.

Final tallies yesterday afternoon finished off the last of the contests. Robert K. Nissen garnered 2,550 votes compared to his Republican opponent, J. Stanley North's 1,993. Only Republican to carry normally Democratic Yuma County was Gov. Paul Fannin.

For the straight ballots, each party cast slightly less than 23 per cent straight tickets. Of 12,315 registered Democrats, 2,816 voted straight party. Of 3,284 registered Republicans, 743 voted the straight ticket.

Top vote getter was County Assessor A. O. (Pop) Williamson who got 10,256 votes.

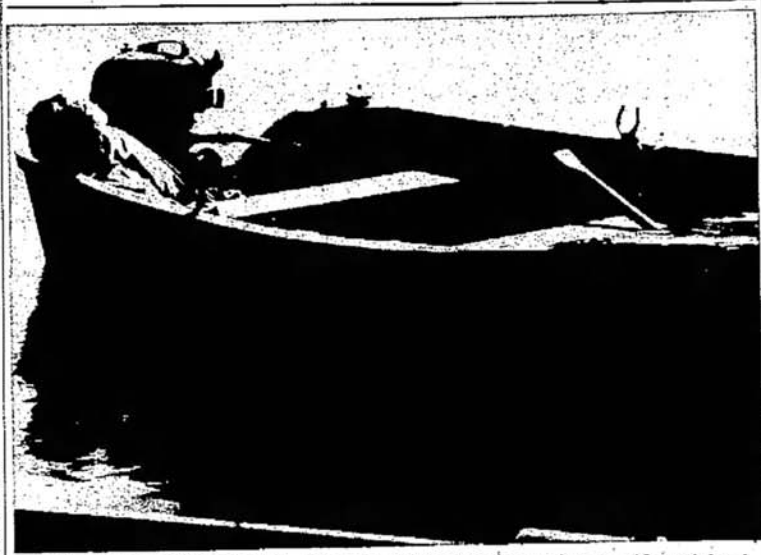

Cibola Man Confesses Killing of Brother

...And brother will turn against brother.

Robert Dunagan, a 58-year-old ranch worker who has lived in the Cibola and Blythe areas since 1911, has admitted to the beating and subsequent killing of his brother.

Dunagan told Undersheriff Jack Chavez that he had been drinking with his brother, Fred, 54, Sunday afternoon and evening at a place called Skip's on the Arizona bank of the Colorado River about 12 miles below the Cibola bridge.

Recalling the details of the evening, he said that they drank until about 9 p.m., when they decided to go home.

Witnesses have related that they watched the two brothers, both pretty well under with alcohol, as they got into their boat and started drifting without starting the motor.

They lived in a cabin on the river bank about one mile downstream from the tavern.

According to Robert's statement, on the way home they began to struggle and he struck his brother over the head with a paddle-like oar.

He attempted to pick his brother up after he hit him, but he could not wake him up.

According to his story when he arrived at the brothers' cabin he got out of the boat and left it to drift.

To Contest For GOP Nomination

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The campaign for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination begins today.

In fact, the top spokesmen of the two wings of the divided Republican party began running Wednesday. They took off while the votes still were being counted but after it was apparent that Richard M. Nixon was losing.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York is the spokesman for

the liberal or left or non-conservative wing of the Republican party.

Latest United Press International figures this morning gave Kennedy 23 states with 334 electoral votes. He led in two undecided states with seven votes for an indicated total of 341. He needed 289 to win. Nixon took 25 states with 188 electoral votes. Returns from all but 2,822 of the nation's 168,140 precincts showed Kennedy had polled 33,444,507 popular votes to 33,098,293 for Nixon. Kennedy's percentage of the total was 50.26.

Sen. John F. Kennedy had taken New York's 45 electoral votes. Newsmen sought the governor to put the usual questions including: Why had New York rejected Nixon who had tailored his policies to fit the governor's pattern? But the governor was gone, apparently in a hurry, and down a fire escape to avoid ambush by embarrassing questioners.

This maneuver was something less than a running start toward the 1964 Republican presidential

STARTS TOMORROW:

Interior Dept. To Be Represented At Colo. River Conference Here

nomination. It is almost inevitable, however, that Rockefeller will be at least as active a candidate for the 1964 nomination as he was for this year's prize. And that would be quite active, indeed.

To be eligible for Republican consideration in 1964, Rockefeller must at any cost avoid being defeated for re-election as governor of New York in 1962. He could avoid defeat by not seeking re-election. If he runs in 1962 and wins by anything less than a big, fat margin, Rockefeller's 1964 run will have set.

Spokesman for the conservative wing of the Republican party is another charter, hard-nosed Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona. Goldwater, too, was off and running in the early hours of Wednesday while the count still was on. Arizona already was safe for Nixon, however, before Goldwater spoke. Nixon was liked in New York and elsewhere but in Goldwater's state the Republicans won.

"If Nixon loses," said Goldwater, "he lost in the South. He gambled the industrial North by losing the South. I told them that at the convention. With the South we would have won his election by now."

Goldwater said the greatest obstacles to Republican success in the South had been the Eisenhower Administration's reaction to the Little Rock, Ark., school integration crisis and Henry Cabot Lodge's remarks about a Negro in the cabinet if Nixon won.

What Goldwater said in the North about a Negro in the cabinet long will be a matter of discussion and speculation. The record shows that he did not say what he was widely quoted as having said—that the Negro cabinet job was a promise.

That journalistic bobbie may have cost the Nixon-Lodge ticket a Southern state or two—South Carolina, for example.

What Goldwater ignored in his faulting Nixon for losing the South was the biggest factor of all. That was Kennedy's selection of Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson as a running mate. Very smart!

Nixon Claims California's 32 Votes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon today claimed California's 32 electoral votes.

Through his press secretary, Herbert Klein, Nixon said he is confident that the count of absentee ballots will give him "a safe margin" in his home state of California over John F. Kennedy.

With all but six of the state's 59,182 precincts reporting, the unofficial United Press International tabulation gave Kennedy 3,119,341 California votes to 3,053,940 for Nixon.

About 250,000 absentee ballots have yet to be counted, however, and Nixon would have to get 57 per cent of them to change the outcome.

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Leaders Back Kennedy Plans

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Presidential-elect John F. Kennedy pledges of Democratic congressional leaders' support for his "new frontiers" legislative program today as he prepared an orderly takeover of the national administration.

At his Hyannis Port, Mass., summer home where he was resting after his suspense-laden victory in Tuesday's election, the nation's first Roman Catholic president promised to name liaison agents today to work with the Eisenhower administration. They will try to insure a smooth transition when the new administration takes over after Kennedy's inauguration Jan. 20.

He also must prepare a legislative program, including an enlarged defense budget and domestic economic legislation, on which he wants action during his first three months in office.

Speaker Sam Rayburn and Assistant Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield both told UPI they would do their utmost to pass a Kennedy legislative program.

Mansfield is heir apparent to Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, who was elected vice president with Kennedy. Johnson probably will be Kennedy's chief lieutenant in working with Congress.

No Republican voices had been raised — yet at least — to question what kind of a mandate Kennedy won in polling a paper-thin plurality over Vice President Richard M. Nixon in the presidential election.

Kennedy carried 23 states with 337 electoral votes and led in two still undecided states for an indicated total of 344 electoral votes, compared with the 269 he needed to win.

But still incomplete returns showed that he had polled 33,241,361 votes against 33,003,733 for Nixon. His percentage of the two-party votes was only 50.24. Counting votes cast for minor party candidates and for independent electors in Mississippi, he received less than 50 per cent of the vote.

The Dixie Highway was the idea of Carl G. Fisher, pioneer automobile manufacturer of Indianapolis, Ind., who also was the founder of the Lincoln Highway movement.
