The law is also unclear on wheth The law is also unclear on whether labor unions and business corporations can contribute to political campaigns. The law forbids direct contributions. But labor unions get around this. They give candidates money collected from union members as "voluntary" contributions.

Corporations get around it, too. They frequently put informal prestop execs to make personal contributions.

So what can be said about the cost of the election?


