The Yuma Mines.—Few people even in the city of Yuma, can realize that within almost the city limits that rich gold mines have been discovered and are likely to prove fabulously rich. The St. Mary's shaft is now down only about 25 feet and two or three days ago the owners of it concluded they would crush a ton of the ore and see how it prospected. Accordingly they constructed a rude Arrastra and crushed about one ton of ore, selected without regard to its special richness and they succeeded in saving about \$50 of most beautiful gold. There is no doubt but that they lost over half the gold, as their arrangements for saving are very imperfect. The ledge is now about twenty inches thick and is increasing in width as it descends and we predict that within the next few months the town of Yuma will be awakened by the shrill whistle of the quartz mill.

The Port Isabel Railroad.—The Surveying party under the direction of Col. Chalmers Scott, sent down by the S. P. R. R. Co. to survey the route of the new railroad from this city to Port Isabel at the head of the Gulf of California, arrived in Yuma on Tuesday evening last. The party consists of twelve men and will commence operations at Port Isabel at once. It will require a longer time to make the necessary soundings that to complete the balance of the survey. The Col. informed our reporter that the entire time, he thought, to complete the soundings and survey, would not be over six weeks. As an item of the cost of making this survey we were informed that the pay role alone will be \$550. per month. When the road is completed, which will probably be about next November, the time from San Francisco to Guaymas will be but 60 hours, as against 9 days now in fair weather and a much longer time when this weather is unfavorable.

All persons are hereby notified that the law in regard to discharging firearms within the incorporated limits of the village of Yuma, will be strictly enforced. Sec. 2 Com. laws provides. That any person or persons having or carrying any pistol or gun, shall, in the public streets or highways, discharge the same in a discriminatory, thereby disturbing the peace or quiet and endangering the lives of the inhabitants of any town or neighborhood in this Territory; such person or persons, upon conviction thereof before any justice of the peace, in the county where such offence may be committed shall be fined in any sum not less than ten or more than fifty dollars and imprisoned in the county jail not less than two nor more than ten days, at the discretion of the justice of the peace together with the costs of prosecution.

Personal letters should not embrace anything of a business character relating to Land Office work, as all letters pertaining to business have to be filed and become a part of the records of the Land Office.

Communications containing money, and all remittances of whatever nature, should be addressed to the "Receiver of Public Moneys," who is the legally constituted officer to receive, hold or disburse moneys pertaining to the business of the Land Office.

The various laws relating to the sale or disposition of the public lands of the Government originally contemplated a personal dealing with the parties having business with the Land Office. But for convenience and to save time and the cost of long journeys on the part of applicants, the laws and regulations have been so modified as to admit of much business being done through the agency of the mails and express companies. In the transaction of business with the Land Office the above directions will please be observed by all persons having business to present.
