LOCAL MATTERS.

Iced Tea at the Palace Hotel.

Mr. Smith, the amalgamator at Yuma Mill, is laid up with a monster felon on his hand.

Isaac Lyons and family left Monday evening for Los Angeles where they will spend the warm months.

Andy Tyner has resigned the Shrievalty and gone to San Bernardino to join his family for a few weeks.

Ladies white Balbrigan hose at 25 cents a pair, very fine, at Lyons'.

The steamer Mohave will leave for Hardyville and way landings on August 2nd.

Iced Tea, Riverside Blackberries and fresh fruit of all kinds served daily at the Palace Hotel.

The hotel at Riverside was burned on the morning of the 13th. The furniture was all saved. Insured.

The census of the city of Brooklyn shows a population of 534,983, a gain of 72,000 in five years.

A fresh lot of Table Linen, Mosquito Netting, White Spreads at Lyons'.

The coinage at the San Francisco Mint for the fiscal year ending June 30th, was \$36,058,000.

F. M. Hodges was appointed Sheriff by the Board of Supervisors, on the 12th inst., in place of Andy Tyner, who has resigned.

Chicago lard, in cans of 3 lbs, full weight, at 3 bits, at Lyons'.

It is reported that a Mexican reached Coyote Wells on the desert, last week, and dropped dead from exhaustion and want of water.

Paul Maroney, Mr. Shearer and Mr. Wright and wife, from Mineral Park, arrived safely, and have gone inside for the summer.

Judge Conger, of whose misfortune we have made mention, is improving, and may be considered as almost out of danger. His eyes are totally lost.

Chicago had over thirty cases of sunstroke on the 14th, thirteen of them were fatal. Thermometer at 90°. What kind of a stroke would a Yumaite get when the thermometer is only 90°.

Two car loads of mining machinery from Rankin, Brayton & Co., passed through Monday, July 12th, consisting of two boilers, two head drums, four mortars, eight boiler stands, all for Walton & Lind's Boston Mill.

A Board of Health should be appointed to see that all filth be removed from the streets and alleys, and lots whether occupied or not, and with full power to enforce whatever action they find necessary. The health of the town will certainly suffer if it is not done.

Calvin R. Howe, of Princeton, Indiana writes us that his son, Chas. J. Howe, was drowned June 8th, between El Dorado Cañon and Hardyville. Any person finding his body will confer a favor by notifying his father or the SENTINEL. Nearly everyone in Yuma will remember Charley. He worked for Mr. Fox, of the Palace Hotel, some months last summer, and was esteemed by everyone who came in contact with him.

An invasion of Indian Territory from Texas on a large scale is threatened, and it is thought probable that the squatters will come in collision with the troops, who have orders to drive them out. The men who have projected this raid must be aware that they are decidedly in the wrong.

The Indian boy who fell from the freight train beyond Stanwix, the evening of the 11th inst., was brought in by the down train next morning. His foot and lower part of his leg were found to be crushed by the wheels. Amputation was performed, and the boy is doing extremely well.

The steamer Mohave arrived July 14th, making the round trip to Camp Mohave in eight days. She brought down 41 tons of ore, 35 from C. D. M. & S. Co., and 16 from Mr. Draper's "Red Cloud." She left on the morning of the 15th for Castle Dome, and returned on the 16th with 40 tons of ore from the C. D. M. & S. Co.

W. B. Larzere, one of Mayor Killoch's bondsmen, asks to be relieved from all liabilities arising upon said bond, and gives as his reason that the Mayor has surprised and disappointed him in his recent political course. Mr. L. is one of the deacons of the Metropolitan Temple, and frequently protested against Mayor Killoch talking politics in church.

Silver District has commenced to boom once more, and we do not anticipate that there will be any let up for some time to come. The Iron Cap at 200 feet have struck a large mass of rich ore. In the Nellie Canyon the prospects are very flattering to the owners, Messrs. Miller & Stein. Mr. Draper, owner of the Red Cloud, has already made a shipment of very rich ore, 16 tons, and will continue to be heard from every week. He is now working twenty men and wants more.

From B. E. Lockhart we learn that the Gunsight is working thirty men, and at 150 feet have struck a vein of rich ore over seven feet in width. The mine, under the supervision of Mr. Blevens, is improving, and promises to be one of the best in the Territory. Warner and Claussen, who bonded the Mineral Bed, are down 25 feet, and are satisfied that they have prospects that rival the Gunsight. This mine is nearly a mile from the Gunsight. Mr. Warner is now in New York. Our old friend Gabe Allen, is at Gila Bend, doing a good business in forwarding freight to these mines. We understand that he has about sold his mine for \$15,000.

Board of Supervisors.

JULY 12th, 1880.

Board of Supervisors met, all present. One proposal for attendance on indigent sick received and accepted, from Drs. DeCorse & Taggart for \$1,200 per year.

Resignation of A. Tyner as Sheriff, received and accepted, and the office declared vacant.

Bill of ARIZONA SENTINEL, for County file allowed on General Fund for \$6 05.

Moved and carried that F. M. Hodges be appointed to fill the vacancy in the office of Sheriff of Yuma county.

Board takes a recess until 2 o'clock, P. M.

Board of Equalization met, all present. Mr. Hopkins appeared for D. Neahr, and falling to show good cause, his assessment was ordered to stand as revised.

Mr. Mabbitt appears for I. Lyons, and showing good cause, his assessment as revised is reduced \$1,000, and to stand revised, \$2,500.

Mr. Cutler appears for Sisson, Wallace & Co., and showing good cause for reduction of raise, their assessment is ordered to stand revised, \$1,000.

H. N. Alexander, Attorney for the S. P. R. R. Co., appears before the Board and makes and files a protest against the assessment of said company's property for the year 1880.

Moved by the chair that said petition be rejected, and that said company's assessment stand as listed. Motion seconded by Mr. Furrer and carried.

There being no further business Board adjourns to third Monday in August.

Board of Supervisors in session, all present.

Bill of A. Tyner, Assessor, allowed for \$800.

Proposal of M. E. Forrest to board county prisoners at \$1 50 per day per head, rejected, on the grounds that bid is too high, and it is ordered that Mr. Levy continue to board same till further action of the Board, at same price as heretofore paid.

Bond of Sheriff presented and approved, and F. M. Hodges ordered to take charge of said office.

Minutes read and approved, and Board adjourns until August 16th, 1880, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

Young Killoch's Case.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15th.—Information has been filed against Isaac M. Killoch by the District Attorney charging him with the murder of Charles de Young. The previous indictment had been dismissed on a technicality.

Lima to be Bombarded.

NEW YORK, July 14th.—A dispatch has been received by the Chilean Legation at Washington, saying that the Chilean fleet has notified the Peruvian authorities that Lima will be bombarded if peace is not soon made. The inhabitants were leaving the city.

The Arizona Central Railroad.

PHOENIX, July 12th.—The organization of the Arizona Central Railroad Company was completed to-day and the following Directors were elected: Joseph G. Henszey and Samuel A. Henszey of Philadelphia. R. H. Bromister, John J. Gosper, E. P. Clark of Prescott. A. T. Samuel A. Henszey, the newly elected Vice-President and Manager, has for several weeks been personally conducting a reconnaissance of the Bradshaw mountains, and will in a few days place in the field a corps, with T. A. Eckoff as engineer in charge. It is the intention of the company to proceed with the construction immediately when the location of the line between Maricopa and Phoenix shall be completed.

Gonzales Undoubtedly Elected President of Mexico.

CITY OF MEXICO, July 3d.—The election returns from the interior show that General Gonzales is far ahead of all competitors, and is without doubt elected President. There is some apprehension on the part of persons not understanding the situation of a revolution if Gonzales is inaugurated. Better informed persons believe that with the present combination between Gonzales and Diaz revolution is impossible, and that every attempt will be crushed instantly. Some excesses have been committed upon free suffrage by the troops in Jalisco. The commanding general, Tallentine, has been ordered to the capital to explain. A band of revolutionists made their appearance in the State of Zacatecas on the 19th instant, but they were defeated with ten killed and several wounded. Only one man was injured among the government troops.

Killed by the Indians—Stage Robbery—Mining News.

PHOENIX, July 15th.—News reached here yesterday noon that Daniel Detrich, of the firm of Morgan & Co., a large mercantile house in Phoenix, was shot and killed by Yuma Indians at his branch store on the Gila river, south of this city. Detrich was all alone at the store. He had locked the door of the store about sundown Tuesday evening, and was standing outside, about six feet from the door, he fell on his face, receiving four bullets in his back. The Coroner's jury went out to-day to view the body and are now in session.

A Florence special to the Herald says that there was no money in the treasure-box at the late robbery of the Globe City stage, but contained packages valued at ninety dollars. Five passengers were on the stage but they were not molested. The three men who robbed the stage are believed to be Mexicans. Detective Paul is in pursuit.

A Final special says grading commenced for ten more stamps for Silver King mill. Swain's mill turned out first bulion from King tailings reported in Roger's Camp, Pioneer District.
