Charley Naylor and family returned home on Wednesday from a month's sojourn at the hot springs, near San Bernardino. Mr. Naylor left immediately for his duties at Maricopa.

General Grant has refused the presidency of the Las Vegas Mining Company, of New Mexico. A good deal of Democratic mud, which was thrown at the General on the supposition that he had accepted the position, is thus gone to waste.

Just received, 30 dozen of those new patent overalls, at Lyons.

Henry Fox, proprietor of the Palace Hotel, returned home on Thursday. The sea breeze at Santa Monica have been more than generous to Fox, they have been just, and have given him health such as he has not enjoyed for years.

Lightning is playing sad havoc in Pennsylvania this summer. Almost all of the great oil fires that have occurred this season have been caused by it. Last Saturday it struck a 25,000 barrel tank at Bradford, setting it on fire.

The steamer *Gila* will leave to-day for Camp Mohave with a full load of freight distributed at way landings. Mineral Park has twenty tons of merchandise aboard, and the Colorado Reservation will get twenty tons of flour. Up to going to press no passengers have been reported.

The body of one of the prisoners who escaped from the Territorial Prison here, was found and buried near Texas Hill a few days ago. He undoubtedly died from thirst and exposure. The other escapee will soon be in his old quarters here, we predict.

Charley Scott has made a perfect "bijou" of his place. That veteran, Tom Downey has exhibited great taste in his work in fixing up things in the carpentering line, while artist Massey has outdone himself in the painting and frescoing. The new bar in the front room is very neat and tasty, and the fixtures are all first-class.

W. M. Reed, a conductor on the Arizona Division of the S. P. R. R. between Tucson and Pantano, fell from the top of his train between two cars and was run over and fatally injured on the 1st instant. He was taken to the St. Ter's Hospital at Tucson, where he died on the 2nd at 4 o'clock P. M. This was Mr. Reed's first trip over the road, having just come down from the C. P. R. R., where we understand, he has been employed for a long time.

Col. Chipley, a prominent San Francisco lawyer, is stopping at the Colorado Hotel. For several years Col. Chipley has been troubled with inflammatory rheumatism, and at last his physicians have had the good sense to send him here. We feel assured that in a short time our climate will accomplish what the physicians have failed in doing.

Mr. Batts, of Maricopa, formerly of Hood & Batts, of this place, has been paying us a short visit on his return from a few weeks' passat at Santa Monica. Like all the rest who have been able to enjoy a few weeks' recreation, he expresses himself as highly delighted with his trip. Mr. B. left for Maricopa on Thursday.

Wallace Leach, the blonde aspirant for Congress from the Fourth Congressional District of California, passed through on his way to Tucson last Thursday. The object of his visit, we understand, is to make himself acquainted with the *modus operandi* of making voters as practiced by the Democrats of Pima county under the Arizona laws. Being a very fluent speaker, he will, doubtless, as the boss champion of a lost cause, take a hand in helping Grant O'uray stay at home.

Miss Nelson's will disposes of \$30,000. Her mother receives \$3,000; Mr. Knight, critic of the *Athenaeum*, \$1,000; Compton, who acted with her in America and watched her doing her ill-uses, \$1,000. The residue she leaves to Admiral Carr Glynne; but it is thought he will decline the legacy, as Lee, the divorced husband of Miss Nelson, may make trouble. It is supposed, however, that the legal protection accorded to Nelson by an English court may defeat him.

San Diego always has something to boast of. One day it is the lovely loveliest place for consumptives to go to and die. The next you hear of the largest kind of a stinger being caught on the beach where they bathe. Now it is that it is the home of the next representative to Congress—in a horn. Only a few days ago he went away on business and all San Diego was despondent, when lo! along came and earthquake, and serenity once more reigns supreme.

At a meeting at Galena, Ohio, on the 30th, General Grant said: "I have never made a Republican speech in my life, or any kind of a political speech. I am sure it would require some time and much preparation to make one of any length. I never voted a Republican presidential ticket in my life and but one Democratic ticket, and that many years ago, when I was quite a young man. But I will pledge you my word here to-night that I am spared—although I shall be at some distance from you—on the 24th of November I shall return to Galena to cast our Republican vote for President of the United States."

The President started from Washington on Thursday. The party will consist of the President, Mrs. Hayes and his two daughters and three others. The Hayes family will spend Sunday at their home in Fremont; devote the next week to a reunion of the President's old regiment at Canton, Ohio, and by September 1st will be joined by Sherman and the other members of the party, and strike out West by way of Chicago and Omaha. They will proceed over the North Pacific to Ogden; thence over the Utah Northern to Salt Lake City, where a brief stay will be made. From there they will proceed to San Francisco, stopping, perhaps, at Carson City and Virginia City.

The Tunnel Rescue.

A whole month has passed since the Hudson River Tunnel catastrophe, and little real progress seems to have been made towards the recovery of the bodies of the men who were buried beneath the great river. What throws discouragement upon the work is the declaration of an engineer of high reputation that the men who venture into the caissons now in process of construction are likely to meet the same fate as did brave Peter Woodland and his men. It is evident that there has been incompetence in the management of the work for recovery of the bodies, since there has been no difficulty which an engineer understanding the case could not overcome in less than a month. It is time for a change in the management of the work, even if the State of New Jersey is compelled to assume control. For the sake of decency, no further unnecessary delay in the recovery of the bodies should be tolerated. And why should not the Canadian engineer, Mr. Richard—the verification of whose predictions of the failure of the methods heretofore employed indicates his understanding the case—be allowed to execute his plan? His reputation as an engineer is a guaranty that he will not undertake the work without knowing how to accomplish it, and offers to rescue the bodies in ten days after taking contract or forfeit him pay is all that could be desired. The Tunnel Company must not permit the pride of its engineers to stand in the way of the employment of the Canadian. Public indignation will condemn those who are responsible for further delay of this rescue.

Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The first Territorial Republican Convention ever held in Arizona has acted with a discretion and moderation that will be of the greatest future good to the party. Their action in reference to the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction is especially commendable. If there is an office outside of the judiciary which especially calls for freedom from religious or political interference, that office is certainly the one which is to have charge of our schools. Against M. H. Sherman we believe nothing can be urged, and in his favor everything is to be said, but we are glad that he goes before the people on his own merits and with nothing more than the endorsement of the convention. We hope our people will vote for the man to fill this office who shall best be qualified to discharge its duties, without regard to his political convictions or affiliations.—*Citizen*.

To-day, in all probability, the Southern Pacific Railroad will cross the line from Arizona to New Mexico. All obstacles in the Dragoon Mountains are practically overcome, and the race for El Paso has commenced in earnest. For several days last month over 12,000 feet of rails were laid. On the 26th 12,800 feet were laid, being the greatest distance ever accomplished in one day by this road. At this rate the road will be in El Paso on Christmas, as it is completed and in running order 136½ miles from Tucson, or 90¾ miles from Benson. Since January 25th the company has built and put in first-class running order 300¾ miles of steel rails. Following is an interesting table of distances on the line of the road: From San Francisco to Yuma, 730.00; From San Francisco to Tucson, 977.93; From San Francisco to El Paso, direct, 1,288.74; From San Francisco to El Paso, via Mesilla, 1,333.10; From Yuma to boundary line, 334.17; From Yuma to El Paso, direct, 588.74; From Yuma to El Paso, via Mesilla, 573.10; From Tucson to Yuma, 247.93; From Tucson to El Paso, direct, 319.81; From Tucson to El Paso, via Mesilla, 325.17.

The Coming Reunion of the Army of the Cumberland.

TOLEDO, Aug. 31st.—Extensive preparations are making for the meeting of the society of the Army of the Cumberland in this city September 22d and 24th. A committee of prominent citizens will visit Galena to request General Grant's attendance, and representatives from the several posts of Ohio have been ordered to convene here for consultation.

The Disaster to the Marine City.

DETROIT, Aug. 31st.—Captain Comer, of the burned steamer *Marine City*, telegraphed that, as near as he can ascertain six of the passengers and two of the crew were lost. The names of the crew are Richard Schultz and James Cook. The names of the missing passengers are as yet unknown, except that of a man who was washed ashore at Sturgeon point, with cuff buttons marked "Watson." There is little doubt that this is Martin T. Watson, a druggist of this city, a young man who came here from Toronto, Ontario, two years since. Captain Comer thinks there were on the steamer twenty passengers. The trip sheet of the boat was lost, so it is impossible to accurately determine the facts.

O'uray's Successor Chosen.

LOS PINOS, Col., Aug. 31st.—At a grand council, held yesterday afternoon, Chief Sapovonari was elected as O'uray's successor. There were only two other applicants for the position—Guero and Pest—the former claiming it by right of promotion, being second in rank, but his known hostility to the whites prevented his promotion. Sapovonari had no desire to be head chief, but wanted a dual combination; he and another to rule jointly. The Utes would not permit. Sapovonari is fifty years old. He has a considerable force of character and a large following. The Utes have killed five of O'uray's best horses, that they may accompany him to the "happy hunting grounds."

Foreign Gold.

CHICAGO, Aug. 31st.—A special to the *Inter Ocean* from Washington says: The gold that is being sent to the mints from New York will probably not be coined for some time to any great extent, owing to the fact that there is little demand for it. It is assayed and United States coin is paid for it; but for the present most of it will be simply stored. Eventually all this foreign coin now arriving will be melted and recoined into eagles and half-eagles. Now the most that is being done in Philadelphia is to make standard dollars. The amount of gold coined monthly is greater than silver, but the number of pieces is very much less. The Treasury Department ordered \$20,000,000 to be placed to the credit of the Superintendent in the assay office in New York with which to pay for foreign gold. It is estimated in the Treasury that \$4,000,000 worth of foreign coin will reach this country per week till November 1st. The debt reduction will scarcely be \$12,000,000 this month, as was at one time anticipated. The receipts have been very large, but there is a very heavy drain on this month's assets. The quarterly payment of pensions has to come out of the August receipts, which this time will amount to \$8,000,000.

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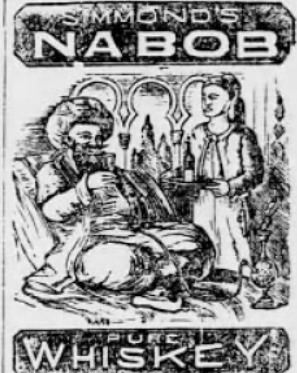
