LOCAL MATTERS.

Thirty car loads of freight for Yuma and up river have arrived during the past ten days.

Capt. Haskell, A. D. C. on Gen. Wilcox's staff has been in Yuma on business this week.

J. J. Stien of Silver District has been visiting his many friends in Yuma this week.

David Balaz arrived home on the 4th inst. Mr. Balaz will remain here until after election, if business will permit.

The Governor's proclamation is out, calling an election on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November. It will appear in full in our columns in the next issue. Meantime printed posters will be sent to every precinct in the county.

The local editor of the SENTINEL has been appointed agent for the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States. He will endeavor to convince the people of Yuma of the great advantages arising from securing a policy of insurance in this world-renowned company.

The steamer Gila and one barge with 125 tons of freight left on the 5th for Silver District. As soon as she returns and can be loaded she will leave for Har- dyville. From present appearances it will not be possible for her to leave on schedule time the 9th, as advertised. Our latest information puts the time for her leaving about the 15th.

The Arizona Concentration Company are now working fifty men and are dry washing from fifty to one hundred tons of dirt daily. The dirt goes from \$2.50 to \$3.50 per ton. Their last clean-up of thirty-three tons averaged \$3.75 per ton, and one lot of twenty-five tons gave \$8 per ton. This company has an immense field for operation. They have machines for working 100 tons of dirt per day, and dirt enough to last for several years. They will soon have 100 machines at work, with a capacity of eight tons to each machine.

The Arizona Concentration Company advertise in this week's issue for proposals for furnishing beef for their camp of fifty men. They will require about three small beefs per week to be delivered at Tyson's Wells, which is six miles from their camp. Within three miles of Tyson's Wells will be found plenty of grass for stock, the butchering to be done at the Wells, where the company will provide corals for the stock. The company's water wagons visit the Wells daily, and every facility will be given to aid parties taking the contract. Tyson's Wells is eighteen miles from Ehrenberg, over a good road.

Monday evening, on his return from Silver District, Hon. G. H. Oury made a speech to the citizens of Yuma. As all were cordially invited to attend, the invitation was readily accepted by all political classes. The Greenbacker was there (the only one so far found in the Territory) as well as a goodly number of Republicans and a few ladies. If the Democrats could fuse with the Greenbacker, we think they would have a majority of one, otherwise it will be a stand-off. The meeting was what an Englishman would call "a bit of a row." Oury's speech was listened to with a great deal of interest, and although enunciating no startling truths, nor presenting any particular reasons that will have a tendency to alarm the Republicans of Yuma county, was well received.

A Fatal Shooting Affray at Ehrenberg.

A fatal shooting affray took place at Ehrenberg on the 4th instant, between Thomas Hallock, William Galloway and Joaquin Moreno, in which Moreno was killed. The facts go to show that Moreno while under the influence of liquor, went into the store of A. Frank, Mr. Hallock being in charge during Mr. Frank's absence to San Francisco, Moreno being abusive and creating a disturbance, was ejected by Hallock and went away. Shortly after, Hallock and Galloway were on their way to dinner, and seeing Moreno, Galloway called out to Hallock to look out for him (Moreno). Hallock replied that he did not think Moreno would do anything. Galloway turned back toward the store, when Moreno fired at him; Hallock then started to turn the corner when Moreno opened fire on him also, wounding Hallock, hitting Moreno in the breast. Moreno then entered a house and commenced firing at Galloway, who had at this time got into Frank's corral, where he grabbed up a needle gun and fired at Moreno, shooting him through the head, killing him instantly. Hallock and Galloway claim that they acted in strict self-defense in the matter, and inform Sheriff Hodges that they are ready when notified to come to Yuma and place themselves under his charge.

THE PEOPLES' CONVENTION.

They Meet in Mass and Irre-spective of Party, Nominate a Full Ticket.

Hon. H. N. Alexander Chairman.

Thursday evening, in pursuance to a call published in the SENTINEL of October 3d, a large number of the citizens of Yuma met at the Court House, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the different offices of the county. At 7:30 o'clock Judge Charles H. Brinley called the meeting to order, and on motion Hon. H. N. Alexander was elected Chairman, and F. B. Wightman Secretary of the Convention. Mr. Alexander, on taking the Chair, thanked the Convention for the honor conferred upon him in calling him to preside over the deliberations of the Convention, and on stating the object of the meeting to be the nomination of candidates for the various offices in the gift of the people of this county, choosing men for their efficiency, irrespective of political considerations, said he hoped the same spirit would be shown in this Convention as was evinced in its call, and that harmony and union would be consulted in the choice of candidates and a hearty support given to secure their triumphant election on the 21st of November.

A motion being made that a committee of five be appointed by the Chair to recommend the order of business and nominations, the Chair appointed S. Purdy Jr., J. W. Dorrington, C. H. Brinley, Dr. J. H. Taggart and Thomas Hughes, who reported the following order of nominations and rules of business:

ORDER OF NOMINATIONS.

Member of Council, two Members of the House of Representatives, Sheriff, Recorder, Treasurer, Probate Judge, District Attorney, Public Administrator, Coroner, two members of the Board of Supervisors.

Precinct officers—three School Trustees, three Justices of the Peace, two Constables, Poundmaster.

RULES.

That all nominations for each office be made collectively, and will be closed upon announcement of the Chair.

Upon the closing of nominations for each office, the nominations will be immediately voted upon.

Voting shall be by ballot.

When there are two or more to be elected to the same office, balloting shall be had for each separately.

A motion of Mr. Hughes that all candidates to both Houses of the Legislature pledge themselves to this meeting that they will oppose any bill for the funding of the Yuma county debt was carried unanimously.

A communication from Silver District, presented by Mr. H. H. Douglas, was read and a motion that it be received and spread upon the minutes of the meeting was carried. The communication is as follows:

To the Citizens' Mass Meeting of Yuma:

At a mass meeting of the citizens of Castle Dome and Silver Districts, A. T., held on the 7th ult., for the purpose of respectfully demanding recognition from the citizens' meeting of Yuma, convening October 7th, according to the population and to further the mining interests of our county and districts, S. S. Draper in the Chair, T. D. MacLeod, Secretary, for the Council, John W. Dorrington, of Yuma; for Representative, George W. Norton, of Silver District; for Treasurer, George Martin, of Yuma; for Supervisor, T. D. MacLeod, of Silver District, were duly nominated.

The Secretary is requested to forward these nominations to John W. Dorrington, to be brought before the Yuma citizens' mass meeting, and respectfully demand that the above representatives be recognized.

Nominations for Council were now announced by the Chair to be in order.

The names of J. W. Dorrington and H. N. Alexander were presented to the meeting and balloting commenced, with the following result: H. N. Alexander, 42; J. W. Dorrington, 37. On motion, Mr. Alexander's nomination was made unanimous.

Nominations for Representatives being now in order, the names of G. W. Norton, J. F. Knapp, J. H. Taggart and Capt. Stephen Thoma were presented. G. W. Norton receiving the highest number of votes was, on motion, declared unanimously nominated. For the second Representative the names of J. H. Taggart and J. F. Knapp were placed before the Convention. The ballot resulted in the nomination of J. H. Taggart, which, on motion of Mr. Knapp, was made unanimous.

Nominations for Sheriff being in order, the names of F. M. Hodges and O. F. Townsend were placed before the Convention. Result of ballot: Hodges, 57; Townsend, 23.

Nominations for County Recorder were now in order, with the names of Samuel Purdy, Jr., and S. G. Lason before the Convention. Ballot: Purdy, 63; Lason, 21. The nomination was made unanimous.

County Treasurer being next in order, George Martin and A. B. DeCourse were placed before the Convention. Ballot: Martin, 55; DeCourse, 22. The nomination was made unanimous.

For Probate Judge, W. H. Tonge, Isaac Levy, and S. Purdy, Jr., were announced.

Ballot: Tonge, 28; Levy, 47; Purdy, 9. The nomination was made unanimous. For District Attorney, H. N. Alexander and L. A. Mullan were announced. Ballot: Alexander, 50; Mullan, 24. The nomination of Alexander was made unanimous.

For the office of Coroner and Public Administrator, Dr. J. H. Taggart was nominated by acclamation, the rules being suspended.

Balloting now proceeded for two Supervisors, and resulted in the nomination of George M. Thurlow and Thomas Hughes. Nominations for School Trustees being in order, a motion that the three candidates receiving the highest number of votes be declared nominated, resulted in the nomination of Messrs. Lason, Martin and Polhamus.

The rules were suspended, and Isaac Levy and W. H. Tonge were nominated by acclamation for Justices of the Peace. S. G. Lason and W. C. Barney were nominated by acclamation for Constables. On motion that the Chair appoint an executive committee of five to devise ways and means for the success of the ticket and fill any vacancies that may occur, the Chair appointed Messrs. Thomas Hughes, J. F. Knapp, W. H. Tonge, Isaac Levy and Samuel Purdy Jr., as that committee.

A motion to adjourn sine die, was carried.

Great credit is due to the Committee on Rules and Order of Business for the admirable manner in which they disposed of their duty, and to the presiding officer of the Convention for his strict and impartial rulings and the dispatch and accuracy with which all business of the meeting was disposed of.

On motion of Mr. Shultz, seconded by Chairman, G. M. Knight was appointed to vacant Clerkship of Board.

Board adjourned to 10 A. M. of the 5th.

Communication received from Mr. Stokes, of Parker, Yuma county, asking for the appointment of Francis Eddy as registering officer for Rawhide precinct. On motion, Clerk ordered to notify Mr. Stokes that his request cannot be complied with, Mr. Eddy not being on the Great Register, and as precincts can only be established on petition of eight voters.

On motion, Ehrenberg was declared an election precinct, polls to be held at the store of A. Frank; A. Frank, Inspector; Judges, T. Goodman and Juan Noll.

On motion, Silver District was declared an election precinct; polls at the store of C. T. Norton; Inspector, J. J. Stein; Judges, A. Crawford and Julius Seabeck.

On motion, Castle Dome Landing was declared an election precinct; polls at the store of the C. D. M. & S. Co.; Inspector, John Sibbald; Judges, Stephen Sumner and Charles Baker.

On motion, Castle Dome mines was declared an election precinct; polls at the C. D. M. & S. Co.'s house; Inspector, Nicholas Gunther; Judges, W. T. Farrar and Isaac Galloway.

Yuma polls at the Court House; C. H. Brinley, Inspector; Judges, W. L. Hopkins and G. S. Riegwald.

Bill for salaries of Supervisors approved by Probate Judge and ordered paid.

There being no further business before the Board, on motion, it was resolved that this Board stand adjourned till Monday, October 12th, 1890, at 10 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of receiving applications for election precincts that may be needed in addition to those already provided.

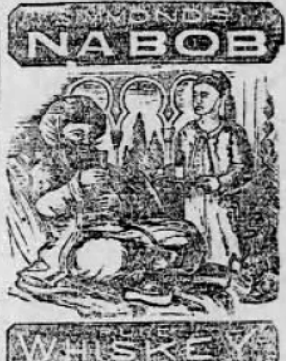
