LOCAL MATTERS.

By an oversight in reading proof, the description of Luck S. Wainright last week made him 6 feet 11 inches high—just 12 inches too tall. The proper correction is now made.

JOHN W. SWENET and others up on the Gila, say that the river is full of water and there is no fear of scarcity. This will insure crops to all who make the proper effort.

The Village Council will meet next Monday night, and it is expected to take immediate steps to pay for the town site and procure a patent for the lands as soon as possible, which is a sensible business move.

In another place we have noted the sale by Lord & Williams of all their interests at Camp Grant to F. L. Austin. Since then their advertisement of the transaction has been handed in, and it appears in the proper place.

The attention of business men, and all others, is called to the notice of W. B. Helling, Esq., in this paper, having reference to certain fraudulent notes held by one C. W. C. Rowell. As Mr. Helling terms him, this "unmitigated scoundrel" case is now open for a public hearing, and will be heard regularly each week until properly closed.

By reference to their advertisements, it will be seen that the firm name of Tully, Ochoa & DeLong, has been changed to Tully, Ochoa & Co. This is one of the best, as it is one of the most reliable firms in Arizona. Travelers, teamsters, miners and all others likely to go that way, will find all needed supplies at their house at Apache Pass, notwithstanding the vile and low-lived attempt and failure of U. S. District Attorney Rowell to have the Post-Trade taken from Mr. DeLong.

MINING matters still receive attention. The reports from every quarter of the disastituted condition of the Indians at the reservations, and of some having fled to the mountains, make people justly cautious. The party who a few weeks ago started for the Huachuca mountains, returned early this week loaded down with fat deer, and brought generally good reports of their mining observations. They are so much pleased with what they saw, that the party will assemble here with additional to it, about the first of next month, to extend their explorations.

Supreme Court.

A number of cases were heard by counsel, some submitted on briefs, etc. Owing to illness of Judge Reavis, the Court adjourned from Friday morning until next Monday.

THE brass-lock mail which left Tucson for Los Angeles, December 30, was returned to this place January 6; that day it, with more mail, was started west again; this morning the same was all returned to Tucson. This is intolerable. Wish we had space to do the subject justice.

No through mail from San Francisco to-day, nor does the latest news indicate a time when there will be. Some 30 tons of mail lie between Santa Barbara and San Francisco.

On the 9th, Granville H. Oury, Clarence Gray and Frank Ganahl were admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of Arizona.

LIEUTENANT JOYCELIN, of Camp Lowell, left this week with a lot of recruits for Apache.

THE Arizona Miner of the 6th comes to us liberally enlarged.

PERSONAL.—The Supreme Court has assembled together much legal talent from abroad as well as unprofessional gentlemen from various parts. Last week we noted the arrival of J. P. Hargrave Esq. from Prescott, a prominent lawyer of the Territory. Monday last, Judge Reavis of the Second District arrived and the Court opened with his honor Chief Justice Titus and Associate Justices Tweed and Reavis. U. S. Marshal Dickson and Clerk H. B. Shaw were present, also the essentially bad King Rowell, (U. S. District Attorney) Clarence Gray, Esq., District Attorney of Yuma county, has been present, and on a brief acquaintance, we regard him as an intelligent, emphatically straightforward man—which argues the trusty lawyer. He returned on Thursday's stage. Frank Ganahl, Esq., noted as a lawyer of ability in Nevada and Idaho, now of Los Angeles, Cal., came here interested in several cases, and left on Thursday. He is a jolly companion, takes a lively hand at politics to please his party, and has many friends scattered all over the Pacific coast. These comprise the lawyers from abroad, and Hon. Coles Bashford, J. E. McCaffrey Esq. and G. H. Oury Esq. each had several cases before the court.

W. B. Helling, Esq., of W. B. Helling & Co. of Salt River, Prescott, and general contractors in Arizona, has been here most of the week; also, Joseph Collingwood, the head of the flourishing mercantile house of E. N. Fish & Co., Florence. F. L. Austin, Post Trader at Camp Grant, has spent the week in town, and in the meantime purchased the entire interest of Lord & Williams at Grant, and hereafter will conduct that business alone.

Major E. C. Mason, who recently started to take command of Camp Apache, was recalled by a special messenger, after being on the way about 24 hours, to proceed to Yuma, to take charge of the transfer of the 21st Infantry at that point. Captain Evan Miles in command of Crittenden was in town a couple of days, and we understand him to have said the troops of that post refused to accept less than four months' pay—their due—and as the paymaster could pay but two, no currency was paid the men there. Joseph Pierson, an enterprising maker of flour at Terrenate, Sonora, has been here for a week with a lot of flour for this market.

At a special meeting of the Village Council, held on the 9th, the following business was transacted: Treasurer Stevens presented his report showing that he received \$903 for rent of plaza; \$498 from dog tax; and \$10 from fines—in all, \$813. He paid warrants to amount of 444 75, and turned the balance of \$368 25 over to the Mayor. The report was examined and approved as correct.

Officers elected at the late election took the oath of office, to-wit: S. R. DeLong, Mayor; Samuel Hughes and W. S. Oury, Councilmen; E. N. Fish, Treasurer; John Miller, Marshal; M. G. Gay, Poundmaster.

The Treasurer presented his bond in the sum of \$2,000 with Samuel Hughes and H. E. Lacy as sureties. Bond approved and money on hand passed to the new Treasurer and accepted for by him. Adjourned to next Monday evening.

A large number of gentlemen from the Pacific coast, at present residing in Washington, called upon Hon. George H. Williams at the National Hotel last evening, to pay their respects and to congratulate him on his recent confirmation as Attorney General. Congratulatory addresses were made by Hon. Mr. Clagett, Delegate from Montana; Governor McCormick, of Arizona; Secretary Gorman, of the United States Senate; Delegate Jones, of Wyoming; and Hon. Joseph McKibben, an ex-Representative from California. Judge Williams made a feeling response, and at the conclusion of his address entertained his visitors with a bountiful collation.—[Washington Star, December 16.]

HON. JOHN B. ALLEN left yesterday for Sweet Water Station, below Saco, with a view to open business there. The stage line has made a station there, and the place always has been a desirable one for trade. We surely hope the venture will prove remunerative.

CAPTAIN A. H. NICKERSON and Lieutenant John G. Bourke, of General Crook's Staff, have both placed us under obligations for official orders, and we have now a complete file of General Orders.
