LOCAL MATTERS.

HEAVY and continued storms in California.

WEATHER early in the week, very cold for this section. Some clouds and milder air now, but no rain this week.

SUPREME Court opinion in the Richard case, will appear next week.

TROOP F, Fifth Cavalry, in command of Second Lieutenant R. F. Stewart, is now encamped about six miles from Tucson, on the Billito. This Troop arrived early in the week.

THE public is reminded that W. A. Hancock, of Phoenix, is prepared to do all kinds of conveying, and he executes legal papers generally. See his card on first page.

CAPTAIN J. V. FUREY, Assistant Quartermaster U. S. Army, latterly stationed at San Antonio, Texas, is to soon arrive and relieve Lieutenant J. L. Johnston at the Tucson Depot. Lieutenant Johnston goes to the Department of the Columbia.

THE advertisement shows a change in proprietors of the stage line from Tucson to Arizona City. We properly referred to the change, last week, and will repeat that the public will be well served hereafter—better than before if business increases.

THE Board of Supervisors met January 27. Petition for road from Sanford to Round Valley was granted and measures ordered to accomplish its object. Clerk was ordered to make out a bill of \$300 against the Territory for rent of room for Supreme Court and its Clerk.

Bills, mostly for jury fees, amounting to \$2,284.42 were allowed, and the Board adjourned to February 13.

PERSONAL—Judge Tweed and daughter, and J. P. Hargrave, Esq., left for Arizona City by Thursday's stage.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Lowe, U.S.A., recently in Department of Columbia, is in town en route to Crittenden for duty.

The unmitigated scoundrel Rowell and contemptible Reavis, left by Tuesday's stage for Arizona City. Governor Safford, E. Ochoa, Charles O. Brown, Lieutenant Johnston, Samuel and L. C. Hughes, and probably some others, leave early to-day for several days' visit to the mines about 35 miles southward.

John G. Capron, Larkin Carr and D. C. Thompson leave for their homes by today's stage.

THE laws and journals of the Sixth Arizona Legislature, have arrived at the Secretary's office in good order; also the compiled laws of the Territory from 1864 to date. The books are being distributed by Secretary Bashford to all entitled to them.

The mechanical execution of these several works, is at the first order, and reflects credit on the Secretary's management. The Compiled Laws, prepared by Secretary Bashford and published under his supervision by legislative authority, is a neat and substantial volume of 627 pages. We regard this work as one of the most important results of the Sixth Legislature, and the perfect arrangement of it is due to Mr. Bashford's careful and intelligent attention.

Supreme Court Proceedings.

Court met Thursday, January 30, 1872, and the following decisions were rendered: The Territory of Arizona ex. rel. David Neahr et al. vs. Charles L. Jones, respondent (certiorari to the District Court, Second District)—Order of the District Court granting injunction and appointing a receiver dissolved and vacated; stay of proceedings stayed in District Court by stipulation.

The Territory ex. rel. Forrest vs. The Territory of Arizona (certiorari to the District Court, Second District)—Order appointing receiver modified as prayed for in relator's petition; writ sustained. Tweed, J., delivered the opinion of the Court; Titus, C. J., concurring.

Wm. S. Oury, administrator, etc., appellant, vs. Milton B. Duffield, respondent—Judgment affirmed. Tweed, J., delivered the opinion; Titus, C. J., and Reavis, J., concurring.

The Territory of Arizona vs. Que-chas, defendant (appeal from the District Court, Second Judicial District—murder)—Judgment reversed on a defective record. Tweed, J., delivered the opinion of the Court; Titus, C. J., concurring.

Territory of Arizona, respondent, vs. Michael Kennedy, appellant (appeal from the District Court, First Judicial District—robbery)—Judgment reversed. Tweed, J., delivered the opinion of the Court; Reavis, J., concurring.

The Territory of Arizona, respondent, vs. Milton B. Duffield, appellant (appeal from the District Court, First Judicial District—obstructing an officer)—Judgment reversed. Reavis, J., delivered the opinion of the Court; Tweed, J., concurring; Titus, C. J., dissenting.

The Territory of Arizona, respondent, vs. William Verduze, appellant (appeal from District Court, Second Judicial District—murder)—Judgment reversed on a defective record. Titus, C. J., delivered the opinion of the Court; Tweed, J., concurring; Reavis, J., absent.

EXIT TWO MORE.

The papers say that about the middle of January, the nationally disgraced Vincent Colyer resigned his place on the Board of Indian Commissioners; and the Washington dispatches of January 22, say that the name of James E. McCaffry (of Tucson), was sent to the Senate by the President for U. S. District Attorney for Arizona. Even the fool and unmitigated scoundrel Rowell will recognize in this his removal from an office he disgraced and used for the people's oppression instead of their good as intended by law. We congratulate the people of Arizona on the riddance of Colyer and Rowell. Let them visit Stoneman for consolation. As we have mentioned all these fellows before and may again, and our space being limited, we cannot give fit official obituaries.

However, we congratulate the people on the choice of J. E. McCaffry. He will do honor to the position, right by the people and government. Even should Rowell insist on turning over his price list for nolle prosequis with the other effects of the office, we assure the public it will not be used by his successor except as one proof of Rowell's unmitigated scoundrelism and the pressing necessity for his removal. Rowell, how about the vacancies in the federal offices? Is not yours first? Reavis, what do you think?

CAPTAIN SMITH, of Camp Bowie, has been doing all that any officer could to recover the lost mails and property and bury the dead occasioned by the recent Apache Pass massacre by Apaches. He recovered all the through eastern bound mail, and nothing but the label, lock and some fragments of the way sack and mail. He also recovered both backboards damaged. He is giving the best possible guards to the mail carriers. He respectfully buried the dead on the 25th. Thomas Dunham (not Donovan as reported last week), once a private in Co. E, Thirty-second Infantry, was one of the killed. John Petty and A. J. Bice have had many hard and victorious fights with the Indians, but this time a chance to fight was not allowed them.

For Captain Smith's labors in this sad affair, the community generally thank him.

A merchant of a prominent house in Tucson, one day this week, declared that if he "were required to illustrate meanness," he "would get a photograph of Judge Reavis;" and had Reavis been in the mining sections of California from 1849 to 1853, his countenance would probably have induced the "honest miners" to hang him.

AN Arizona City letter to us from an intelligent citizen, of date January 30, says:

I assure you, sir, it affords me much pleasure to be able to congratulate you for the success of your efforts in the removal of Rowell. You have no idea of the amount of benefit you conferred upon this community. The people here all feel grateful, and consider themselves under obligations of no small importance to you.

THE Apaches who massacred the three men and captured the mails January 24, at Apache Pass, were clad in soldier blouses and had fine needle guns. Fine commentary on the reservation policy as inaugurated by Colyer.

JAMES FISK JR., liberally provided in his will for his parents and wife—the latter getting the bulk of the property as was proper. Jay Gould was made executor.

It will be seen by reference to the published record, that not one of Rowell's judgments was affirmed by the Supreme Court.

COMPANY F, 21st Infantry, in command of the illustrious Captain Nelson, has left Grant on its way out of the Territory.
