### LOCAL MATTERS.

DISTRICT COURT adjourned Thurs-  
day until Monday next.

SWEET potatoes are in this market  
from the Gila settlements, and they  
are very good, too.

THERE is a salable puppy, of the  
genus squirt, with some human re-  
semblance, running at large in Tucson  
without any visible collar on, or means  
of getting nutritious bones for dirty  
work.

SOME half dozen Apaches were seen  
skulking in the valley above Lee &  
Scott's water mill, on last Wednes-  
day. Parties moving outside should  
keep a sharp lookout.

QUITE a heavy snow storm pre-  
vailed at Apache Pass last Sunday  
morning. The mountains adjacent to  
Tucson wore white peaks the same  
morning, but the weather in the val-  
leys has been specially agreeable.

P. R. BRADY, Esq., is in town.  
He reports that the Pima Indians are  
mostly foraging on the settlers above  
their reservation. From several sources,  
we learn that Agent Stout has fully  
perfect control of those Indians as he  
has over the winds.

THE Trustees of this School Dis-  
trict are actively preparing to have a  
public school opened, and we are  
pleased to note that the Board of Su-  
pervisors are acting in harmony with  
them. No town of this size in the  
United States possesses should be  
without a free, public school.

WALTER S. JOHNSTON, Esq., a law-  
yer by profession, and brother of Cap-  
tain J. L. Johnston, Quartermaster at  
Camp Lowell, arrived here lately from  
Pennsylvania. He is in this climate  
experimenting with reference to its  
effect upon his health, and in any  
event will probably make a stay of  
only a few months.

MAJOR H. R. MIZNER, of Camp  
Lowell, obliges us with some clippings  
from Detroit papers containing the  
news of the loss of the steamer R. G.  
Coburn, on Lake Huron, about the  
20th of October. It seems quite cer-  
tain that among the lost passengers  
was First Lieutenant William At-  
wood, of Captain Fuller's Company,  
Twenty-first Infantry, now at Camp  
Apache, but was then acting as Aid on  
the Staff of General Cooke, command-  
ing Department of the Lakes. Lieut-  
enant Atwood's conduct was highly  
spoken of during the trying hours  
which preceded the sinking of the  
steamer. His death promotes Second  
Lieutenant John M. Ross, now at  
Camp Lowell.

A WASHINGTON correspondent of  
The Sacramento Record, recently  
wrote to that paper a paragraph about  
the "played-out" Colyer, and then  
referred by way of contrast to the  
Governor as follows:

Governor Safford is a man quite as  
kind and humane as Mr. Colyer, yet  
who brings to the consideration of  
the Arizona difficulty a practical  
judgment of the Indian character and  
a knowledge of how to deal with it.  
And when Governor Safford takes up  
the sword and rifle, it is because the  
peace-life is no longer efficient.

The petty tyrant Colyer, and his  
servile tools, played their little des-  
potic parts with pompous insolence  
and much brevity. In treating with  
contemptuous silence the practical  
Governor's sincere overtures to assist  
in bringing about peace, the short-  
sighted upstarts developed their glaring  
unfitness for public duties and their  
decline began which has in ef-  
fect demolished them and placed the  
Governor higher in public estimation.

DEATH SENTENCE.—At the present  
term of the District Court of Yuma  
county, William Gertrude and the In-  
dian named Que-cha-co were tried for  
murder and found guilty, and sen-  
tenced to be hung by his honor, Judge  
Reavis; the former for the murder of  
Mary Anschutz, at Prescott, and the  
latter for that of Sheriff J. J. Dana,  
of Yuma county.

### Another Wholesale Indian Mas- sacre.

Six more good men have been mur-  
dered by Indians. This terrible mas-  
sacre occurred on the 5th instant nine  
miles west of Wickenburg. The  
western bound stage on that day had  
on board as passengers Frederick Sho-  
holm, Frederick W. Loring, P. M.  
Hamel, W. G. Solomon, C. S. Adams,  
William Kruger, Miss Sheppard, and  
John Lanz, driver. When passing  
through an arroyo, the attack on  
them was made by, as is variously re-  
ported, from nine to thirty Indians,  
and at the onset all but Kruger and  
Mollie Sheppard were killed, and they  
both wounded. One of the men was  
lanced and scalped—name not re-  
ported. All the dead were brought  
back to Wickenburg and there buried.

We heard of the above last Monday  
and for reliable details waited till this  
morning, when our space is nearly  
occupied, and now can only say that  
Messrs. Loring, Hamel and Solomon  
were members of the Wheeler Expedi-  
tion; Adams, Shoholm, Kruger and  
Sheppard of Prescott. The murder was  
quite surely the work of the Apache  
Mohaves. A friend at Prescott pro-  
mises us a complete account by next  
mail, which will appear in our next  
paper. Week after week such sad and  
sickening reports come to us for record,  
and yet there are a few men so des-  
pically mean as to say the Indians  
want peace. Shylock was a saint in  
comparison to such heartless and  
avaricious wretches.

### Supervisor's Doings.

The Board met on the 15th, as per ad-  
journment. Present—a full Board with  
District Attorney McCaltry.  
Upon considering a communication  
from the Board of School Trustees, it was  
ordered that all that portion of Pima  
county embracing the settlements at the  
Laguna north of Tucson to and covering  
the settlements at Punta del Agua south  
of Tucson, and all intermediate settle-  
ments, be established and known as School  
District No. 1; also, that said Board of  
School Trustees be authorized to rent the  
building at Lee & McArthur corner of Mey-  
ers and McCormick streets at a monthly  
rent not to exceed \$16, and to furnish it  
with seats, desks, blackboards, etc., at a  
cost not to exceed \$300.

It was ordered that Cate, an indigent  
citizen, be admitted for treatment to the  
hospital.

Bills were audited amounting to \$252 50.  
One bill was passed for further consid-  
eration, and in the matter of the bill of Jas.  
Speedy for payment of \$250 for a horse,  
saddle and bridle taken by Salvador Can-  
calario, an escaped county prisoner, it  
was unanimously ordered that the claim  
be disallowed.

The Board adjourned to November 30—  
Thanksgiving Day, may it please your  
honors.

FROM various parties we learn that  
the report of the late U. S. Grand Jury  
is a nauseous dose to the Army in Ari-  
zona, and that the good officers in this  
Department are anxious for a more  
public and thorough exposition of the  
assertions of that document. They  
now recognize that sneers about press  
accusations will not make black white.  
Gentlemen of the army, this paper is  
now as it ever has been, the warm  
and even jealous friend of every just  
and upright officer among you, and  
your every effort to weed out the bad  
ones, will meet with our enthusiastic  
approbation.

SOME of the Third Cavalry officers  
at McDowell are engaged in prefer-  
ring charges against each other, and  
reports agree that they are mostly  
based on spiteful grounds. Well, the  
result will probably be this: The  
really good, honest ones will emerge  
from the trouble above suspicion, and  
the unworthy ones may be exposed  
and punished.

PRESIDENT GRANT has declared  
that he has no policy to urge in Ari-  
zona against the wishes of the people  
here; also that no officer will be dis-  
turbed by him for any views he may  
hold on the Indian question. What  
does Colyer's few Arizona flunkies  
think of the facts?

MAJOR JOHN GREEN has been re-  
lieved of command at Camp Apache  
and will leave Arizona. He had with  
zeal about this Territory and people  
while here, and will no doubt keep it  
up when away. Go it, ye hot and  
drammer.

MAJOR W. B. HOOPER of San Fran-  
cisco has been working faithfully in  
behalf of Arizona and against the  
machinations of Colyer.
