OUR JOURNAL.

THE LAWS OF 1867-7-8.

The case of Poindester against the Vulture Mining Company and others, was decided at the last October term of the District court for Yavapai Co., held at Prescott.

The plaintiff claimed an interest in the Vulture mine by original discovery and location in the year 1863.

The defendants demurred to the plaintiff's complaint, on the ground that it appeared upon the face thereof that neither the plaintiff nor his grantors had been in possession of said mine within two years next preceding the commencement of this suit.

The defendants relied upon an Act approved November 5th, 1863, passed by the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona, which is as follows:

Sec. 1. No action for the recovery of property in mining claims, or the recovery of the possession thereof, shall be maintained unless it appear that the plaintiff, his ancestor, predecessor or grantor was seized or possessed of the premises in question within two years before the commencement of the action.

The plaintiff's counsel contended that the laws passed by the Legislative Assembly of Arizona Territory for the years 1863-7-8, were invalid, and of no force or effect, whatever because the Governor made the appointment of the members of the Legislative Assembly for those years, and consequently the statute of limitations referred to being void, the plaintiff's cause of action was not barred by that statute.

The case was fully argued by counsel on both sides. Judge Tweed, after a careful consideration of the question, held that the demurrer was well taken. That the session laws of 1863-7-8 were valid, and had been since their passage and approval by the Governor.

The Judge further held that, if for any cause, these laws had been invalid, they had been made valid by the Act of Congress approved March 23d, 1870.

This decision sustains, in effect, the opinion of Chief Justice Tilton, made nearly one year ago, in a case arising in Pima County. Two of the ablest Judges this Territory has ever had, have held that the Session laws of Arizona Territory for the years 1863-7-8 have always been valid and in full force and effect thereby overruling the malicious and stupid opinion made by Henry T. Backus, while he was a Judge of this Territory.

Hon. A. McKey and Dr. Wilbur, who arrived in town on Sunday last with returns from the Gila, left for their homes by Thursday's stage. Capt. John Owen and David Gibson, who accompanied them here, are still in town. All these were industrious and live men in the late election.

J. E. McCaffrey's majority for District Attorney, over T. P. Duffley, is 232. M. R. Platt's vote for Coroner, there being no opposition, is 435.

The People's Council ticket was elected by an average majority of 298; their Assembly ticket, by 197; and their Supervisors by a fraction over 129.

In the Tucson Precinct, the People's candidates for Justices of the Peace and Constables were elected by majorities averaging about 200.

The late November elections throughout the State have generally given Republican majorities, though some of them reduced from Grant's in 1868. The Democrats have gained a few Congressmen. Next week we will give results so far as received.

La mayoria de J. E. McCaffrey para Procurador del Distrito sobre T. P. Duffley es de 232. El voto de M. R. Platt para Coronario es de 435, no habiendo oposicion.

La boleta del Consejo del Pueblo fue elegida por una mayoria de 208; su boleta de la Asamblea por una mayoria de 197, y sus Superintendentes por una facion sobre 129.

En el Precinct del Tucson los candidatos para Jueces de Paz y Alguaciles Mayores fueron electos por una mayoria de 299 votos por termino medio.

El Voto Mejicano.

Ningun representante al Congreso ha jamas hablado con tan ardientes palabras de respeto y cumplimiento hacia la poblacion Mejicana de Arizona como lo hizo el Gov. R. C. McCormick. En su discurso del 11 de Julio, se refirió a ellos en varios bien marcados parrafos; y en todas circunstancias el ha defendido sus derechos y sus intereses.

En su mensaje a la Quinta Legislatura Territorial se expuso en los terminos siguientes:

"En todas vuestras legislaciones atendida a la grande poblacion del Territorio que no estan versados en el idioma Ingles, pero dignos simularlo de todo respecto y proteccion. Esta poblacion abraza a varios excelentes y energicos ciudadanos los cuales son notables por su obediencia a las leyes y su pronto contribucion de rentas internas, como tambien por su caracter industrial."

Como todos los negocios del Territorio, dependen y estan identificados con casi todas las procepciones la restriccion del codigo que impedia ser jurado a alguien que no entendiese las procepciones en Ingles debe como materia de justicia renoverse y los procepos ha curso en Ingles y Castellano o servise de interprete.

Desearo tambien que todas las leyes de importancia general se impriman en ambos idiomas. En acuerdo con esta sugerion se retiro la restriccion del codigo por un acto de la Legistura y hoy dia los ciudadanos de origen Mejicanos se sientan en nuestros jurados segun o no el Ingles."

Ciertamente que el protocolo del Gov. R. C. McCormick tocante a la poblacion Mejicana es todo lo que ellos o sus amigos podian desear mas y esta es una razon por que no los pudieron hacer votar contra el a pesar de los esfuerzos que hicieron para forzarlos a votar. Por lo que hace a la relacion de que el Gov. McCormick ha hablado disparatadamente de los Mejicanos la sealamos como la mas baja falsa que bien le saber sus inquilinos autores.
