

OPPOSITION TO MONOPOLY.—MEETING OF THE MERCHANTS OF SAN DIEGO. Pursuant to advertisement, published in the DAILY UNION, the business community of San Diego assembled at Horton's Hall last evening. A. Pauly, Esq., was called to the chair, and S. W. Craigie, Esq., was chosen Secretary.

The chairman stated the object of the meeting to be the matter of freight charges between San Francisco and San Diego. The old line had advanced their charges as soon as the opposition had been drawn off, and the advance would probably continue until the merchants of San Diego might as well close business. While they were ready to pay fair rates, they were unwilling to submit to oppression and extortion.

C. P. Taggart, Esq., addressed the meeting. The speaker said that the Pacific Mail Steamship Company would, if properly encouraged, remove their ships at this port. The company only asked that the mercantile community of San Diego would stand by them and assure them of their support.

The following named merchants and business men of San Diego pledged themselves to ship all their freight, and to travel by the steamships of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company for six months, or one year, from date: McCormick & McLellan, Carroll & Sterling, Smith & Craigie, W. A. Abbott, M. E. Leach, A. Pauly & Sons, E. W. Nottage, W. A. Heggie, A. E. Horton, Jacob Allen, W. W. Phillips, Steiner & Klaber, Edwards & Clark, H. B. Hirsch, J. A. Shepherd, J. G. Maxwell, I. Lankershim.

A Committee of six—Messrs. Craigie, McCormick, Julian, Pauly, Maxwell and Mannasse—was appointed to canvas the city and secure signatures to the contract with the Mail Company, looking to a permanent arrangement for the shipping of freight between San Francisco and this port.

After remarks from several gentlemen relative to the importance of securing arrangements for freights by the Mannasse steamships, the meeting adjourned, subject to the call of the chairman.

MURDER IN ARIZONA.—The Sheriff of Yuma county, Arizona, was shot by an Indian, recently, and killed. The particulars as related to us are as follows: The body of a Mexican woman, horribly mutilated, was lately discovered in Arizona City, and the Indians who live in the vicinity were suspected of having committed the murder. The Sheriff of Yuma county, Mr. James Dana, undertook to ferret out the murderers, and with that intention visited a rancharia close to town. While searching one of the huts, a squaw struck him on the shoulder with an axe, making a large slash. This infuriated the Sheriff, who drew his pistol and discharged it at the squaw, the ball taking effect in her side. He had scarcely discharged his pistol at the squaw, when an Indian standing by shot him with an arrow, which entered his left side, and killed him almost instantly. A party of men started in pursuit of the Indian who committed the murder; and if caught by them he will receive but little mercy at their hands. The murdered man was spoken of as a good officer, always ready to attend to his business.

THE MINES.—We are informed that last week an injunction was served on several persons living in the Julian Mining District, in this county, ordering them to cease cutting trenches, digging ore or precious metals, or otherwise committing waste upon the Cuyamaca Rancho. The parties on whom the injunction has been served are preparing to take legal steps to set it aside. In the mean time, they continue to work the same as they did previously.

THE ORIZABA.—The steamer *Orizaba*, started for the new wharf at National City yesterday morning, but had failed to reach there up to the time of our going to press. The cause of her failure is attributable to the fact that the vessel was not kept in the channel. The steam or had aboard about 36 tons of freight for Gordon, Hazard & Co., National City. About 25,000 pounds of wool are awaiting shipment from the new wharf by the steamer.

WINE PRESS.—Mr. A. E. Massey, of Massey's Ranch, received by the steamer *Orizaba*, on Sunday last, a large wine press. The press is one of the latest inventions, and it is claimed to be superior to any press hitherto in use. Mr. Massey, we are informed, will make more wine this year than we stated he would. He will probably make this season as much as 15,000 gallons.
