STAY OF EXECUTIONS ASKED.

His Excellency Governor Safford has been petitioned to order a stay of execution in the case of the young man, William Gertrude, who was tried (change of venue from Yavapai county) in the District Court at Arizona City, recently, for the murder of Mary Anschutz, at Prescott, in September, 1870, convicted and sentenced to be hanged on the 29th of this month.

The Executive has been also similarly applied to in the case of the Indian Que-cha-ea, who was convicted of the murder of Sheriff Dana, of Yuma county, and sentenced to be executed on the same day. The Governor has declined to interpose in either case, deciding that, in the first, the Court that tried Gertrude has power to grant the relief sought (the point sought to be made being that one of the jurors was not at the time a citizen); and, in the second case, that the crime alleged to have been committed by the Indian, was against the laws and people of Arizona, and, hence, was tried in a Court of competent jurisdiction (the point being that the Territorial Court had no jurisdiction, because the accused was in some manner under United States care). These are interesting legal points.
