#### GANERAL JAIL DELIVERY.

INCAPE OF SIX PRISONERS FROM THE YUMA JAIL.

On the night of Sunday the 28th ultimo, six prisoners con-fined in the Jail at this place, made their escape. Their names and the crimes for which they were convicted, are as follows: Wm. Gertrude, agrault with dead-

ly weapon. This is the man who murdered the woman in Prescott several years ago Patrick Lany, convicted of murder at Cerbat, Mohave co.

Cannto Soto, murder in second degree.

Que-cha-qua, murder in second degree

Jas. McGuire, misdemeanor. John Maynard, These men are now at large

though Sheriff Goodwin and officers are making every effort to catch them. The escape of these convicts

causes a very painful feeling in this community, and will thro' but the Territory and the border-ing State of California, as the facts become known.

The efforts of the good people of this Territory to apprehend criminals and punish crime, have not generally been crowned with ccess. Many of the most hardened criminals have not been arrested, and many, when arrested, have slipped through the meshes of the law by some miserable technicality.

But here were a number of des perate and abandoned characters who had, at great expense to the tax-payers, been duly tried and convicted, and incarcerated in our new jail, of which we have lately been boasting, all at once swrned loose upon society—three of them with their hands still reeking with the blood of their fellow-men! No wonder there is excitement. The people will demand to know who is in fault in this matter; and they have a right to know. The people will ask how these prisoners became possessed of the implements by the aid of which they made their escape, and why it was so easy to break jail with said implements

There is one piece of iron in the hape of a T about 15 inches by 8. This appears to have been used to make the hole through the adobe wall. One spike, or 20 penny nail, and an old rezor, completed the list of tools used. The nail was evidently used to wrench out the staples that held the iron doors of the cells in place when locked. The razor was used by Gertrude in sawing off one of his shackles. After the prisoners had got out of the cells, it was very easy to dig the hole through the wall, under the window, and after crowding through said hole space next to the stockade, they had only to knock out one of the poles forming the stockade, which pole was held by a rail to a thin plate at the top, and pull said pole out of the ground, into which it was inserted about 15 inches. They then leaned said pole against the outside wall, and using it as a ladder, scaled said wall and were free.

Five prisoners declined to es pe, although the way was left open for them.

Such are the facts. We forbear to comment on this most unfortunate affair, at this time, or to at tempt to fix the blame upon any particular person; for in doing so

we might do injustice.
The matter will doubtless undergo a thorough investigation by the Board of Supervisors and the Grand Jury.

There is great wrong some-where. Justice is thwarted, and the worst of convicts let loose upon the country to pursue their nefarious inclinations. This is lamentable. It is only by the prompt and certain punishment of crime that we can strike terror to the heart of the evil-doer, and expect to enjoy security of life and property, and when facilities are allowed for the easy escape of convicts from our prisons, we are only offering premiums for outlawry and the commission

erime. Let there be a searching inves tigation, and let the blame fall where it belongs.

THE SAN DIEGO AND ARIZONA MILITARY TELEGRAPH.

Capt. Price and Mr. Hain energetic and indefatigable Telegraph constructors, are in town. The Captain has kindly handed to us the following items, which will be interesting to our readers. We may safely say that, nsidering the desert country which had to be encountered in assing through the sand hills to void Mexican Territory, the peed with which this line has on constructed is unprecedent-

The San Diego construction arty is at this moment 60 miles est of Yuma, and expects to take the jun here in 15 days.

The party constructed 24 miles in three days, and 13 miles in two days—a total of 37 miles in five days—being probably the best stringing of wire made by any

enstruction party on the line. The Maricopa party constructed the line along the Maricopa desert from Maricopa Wells to Gila Bend 411 miles, in eight days, and is at Kenyon Station.

The party working from Yuma stward is at Stanwix Station. Within eight days the wire cott, and by the 12th proximo the connection will be completed to an Diego.

The desert survey hence to the Monument has been successfully ecomplished, and the entire line staked at intervals of 104 yards pleasant words, which we find from the construction point. The enterial for this section is now oing out on the line.

Construction on the Tueson diision will be commenced at once, ad there is no doubt of its com.

etion before December.
All parties on the line are sendng the work along with all possi-te snap and vim.
