Caught.

It is with pleasure that we announce the capture of Que-cha-ca, the Yuma Indian who was convicted of the crime of murder one year ago, and upon whom the sentence was not executed because of some legal informality, and who made his escape subsequently.

It appears that last Saturday evening he was in town and was pointed out to C. Gray, Esq., who at once endeavored to arrest him, but the Indian turned and ran, whereupon Mr. Gray drew his pistol and commenced firing upon him. The Indian fell at the corner of Mr. Hughes' Saloon, and was secured and lodged in jail. Three of the shots had taken effect one breaking his arm, one passing through his hand and another through his thigh.
