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No Verdict in Meadows Case.

The case of the Territory vs. C. S. Meadows, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, went to trial last Saturday morning and the case was given to the jury at 5 o'clock in the evening. After an all night's session the jury reported to Judge Campbell Sunday morning that they were unable to agree upon a verdict, and were discharged. They stood eight for conviction and four for acquittal.

The alleged assault, in this case was upon W. F. Timmons, who was then district attorney of Yuma county, and the affair created more than a three days' sensation. Mr. Timmons alleged that Meadows held him up with a big gun while Mrs. Meadows wiped him across the face with a buggy whip. Meadows denies the gun play feature of the episode, while Mrs. Meadows declares that she only rapped the district attorney a few times with her parasol. The affair grew out of a series of law suits between the Meadows and Mrs. E. Frankel, Timmons figuring as the latter's attorney.

A \$3,000,000 Mine Sale.

One of the biggest mining deals in the Southwest for years was consummated last week in the sale of the Cavannah copper mines in Pinal county to Charles M. McNeil and his associates for \$3,000,000. Those associated with Mr. McNeil in the purchase are: Sherwood Aldrich, mine operator of Colorado Springs and Rhyolite; D. C. Jacklin, general manager of the great Utah Copper Company. The Guggenheims are also in on the deal.

Official announcement of the purchase was made in Los Angeles Saturday by Mr. McNeil, who is one of the principal owners of the Utah Copper Company, and is himself a multi-millionaire.

The Ray and Cavannah properties are located six miles north of Yuma, on the new main line of the Santa Fe, in Pinal county, Arizona, and only a short distance from the Gila river. They cover nearly 2,500 acres of porphyry containing a blanket vein or deposit of disseminated chalcocite having a known thickness of 150 to 350 feet.

Information for Prospectors.

For the information of our prospectors or friends we will again state that the editor of the Blade, early in the session of the 24th legislative assembly, passed an act repealing the clause in the mining law requiring the locator of an abandoned mining claim to state in his notice whether or not the whole or a part of ground located is located as abandoned property. Under our amendment to the law an abandoned claim is relocated just as if it had never been located before. We also included in our amendment a clause providing that the relocation of abandoned ground may, if he so elect, perform his location work by sinking the old shaft ten feet deeper, or in case the old work consisted of an open cut or tunnel, he may do his location work therein by removing the 24 cubic feet of material therefrom. This amendment is now the law and all locations heretofore made and rendered void by failure of the locator to state in his notice that the whole or a part of the ground relocated was abandoned property, are made valid by our amendment.—Florance Blade.

Finish Dam in 18 Months.

Molina Case Appealed.

Motion for a new trial in the case of Ygnacio Molina was argued before Judge Campbell yesterday morning, the motion being denied.

Mr. Wupperman of counsel for defendant, asked for a new trial on alleged irregularities in the jury room while the case was on trial, but before it had been submitted to the jury. One of these irregularities was a game of cards in which others were engaged besides members of the jury. Other irregularities were alleged, and the attorney further said something of newly discovered evidence, but the plea was without avail.

After turning down the motion for a new trial Judge Campbell sentenced Molina to one year's imprisonment, the minimum penalty for manslaughter. Notice of appeal to the supreme court was at once given, and Judge Campbell announced that the young man would be admitted to bail, pending action of the supreme court, in the sum of \$5,000. Bond was at once furnished, the sureties being E. F. Sanguinetti and J. M. Molina, father of Ygnacio.

Considering Ygnacio Molina's good record in this community, where he has lived all his life, there are a great many people here who strongly hope that the higher court may view his case favorably and remand it back for a new trial.

Criminal Docket Cleared.

Following the disposal of the Harqua Hala murder case today the cases against Charles Meadows, charged with assault with deadly weapon, and against H. O. Harris for murder, were dismissed upon motion of the district attorney. Both of these cases had been on trial and in each the jury disagreed. This cleared the criminal docket, and all the jurors were discharged.

As Judge Campbell has to open Federal court in Tucson Monday, the term here will end not later than Saturday.

Yuma county at the present term has sent five men "on the hill." The sentence of Romero and Chavez makes the total number of "lifers" in the prison now 45.

Life Sentence--Slayers of Fred Kiser at Harqua Hala.

The trial of the two Mexicans, Chavez and Romero, for the murder of Fred Kiser, was begun in the district court Monday morning at 9 o'clock, and was not submitted to the jury until noon today. At four o'clock the jury returned a verdict of murder in the first degree and named the penalty of imprisonment for life. From the first ballot, the jury stood eleven for first degree and hanging, while one man voted persistently for acquittal, but a compromise verdict was finally reached, as above stated.

An attempt was made by the defense to build up a plausible suicide theory, but the strongest point of the defense was the effort to establish an alibi for the accused—the compromise verdict naming life imprisonment was the direct result of the evidence in support of this.

The evidence against the accused, though circumstantial, was very strong.

Evidence was presented showing that Fred Kiser had previously arrested the two Mexicans for drunkenness. William Carpenter testified that the deputy sheriff subsequently said that they (Chavez and Romero) "were after him," but that he could not watch them all the time if he got any sleep.

While dying Kiser said to Carpenter, "The Mexicans got me at last." He told Superintendent Olsen that Chavez held him by the throat while Romero shot him." After Olsen had captured the two men Kiser plead with Carpenter for his gun. He said: "Get my gun and let me up and I will save you boys a trip to Yuma, and Yuma county the expense of a trial." The jurors in this case were:
