HELSINKI March 6 UP Finland agreed today to talk treaty with Russia and prepared to name the delegation which will negotiate on Generalissimo Josef Stalin's request for a friendship and detense pact.

The foreign affairs committee of the cabinet scheduled a meeting to liscuss composition of the treaty delegation and a blueprint for nunter-proposals which could be basis for negotiations. The delgation will be under clear orders rom the Finnish parliament to egotiate on a friendship pact but ot to discuss the military alliance also requested by Stalin-

Reliable reports said the delegaon will include at least two of he negotiators who helped draw op the peace treaties with Russia 1940 and again in 1941.
